Course Title: Correctional Law

Course Prerequisites: None

Textbook(s): Smith. Law and Contemporary Corrections. Cengage. (For the exact textbook requirement, please refer to your instructor's course information syllabus.)

Course Description: Studies the legal rights and obligations of the convict-probationer, inmate, and parolee. Surveys methods of enforcing both rights and obligations and the responsibilities of corrections agencies and personnel under correction law (Constitutional, statutory, and regulatory provisions).

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of the course, the student will:

- A. outline the historical development of Correctional law;
- B. outline of how and where laws are made;
- C. identify the rights and liabilities of jail and prison personnel;
- D. identify the rights of inmates and others under Correctional supervision;
- E. describe the rights of clients in alternative programs;
- F. describe the role of jail and prison personnel in a typical civil lawsuit

To achieve the learning outcomes, the student will:

- 1. outline the historical development of Correctional law; (A,B)
- 2. describe the need for laws to governing correctional facilities; (A,B,C,D,E,F)
- 3. describe historical view of American law versus English law; (A)
- 4. identify the Constitutional rights of prison and jail inmates; (D,E,F)
- 5. identify the Constitutional rights of probationers and parolees; (D,E)
- 6. recognize legal limitations governing Correctional personal and their clients. (C,D,E,F)
